


Chesapeake Bay



The majority of rivers in Virginia drain into the Chesapeake Bay.




North Carolina Sounds


Gulf of Mexico



Rivers in the southwestern portion of Virginia drain into the Mississippi River. The Mississippi River eventually drains into the Gulf of Mexico.




Clinch-Powell

Big Sandy




The Big Sandy River is part of the Tennessee River drainage basin. Water from the Big Sandy

Holston




Virginia and discover the watershed to which each belongs.

New




Click each of the numbered circles to learn about each of the river systems in Virginia and discover the watershed to which each belongs.

James




Virginia and discover the watershed to which each belongs.

The James River is the longest running river in Virginia. The James River runs from west to east and drains into the Chesapeake Bay. The James River drains 10,432 square miles in Virginia.




Roanoke



The Roanoke River runs west to east through Virginia and North Carolina. Eventually, the Roanoke River empties into the Albemarle Sound of North Carolina.




Potomac-Shenandoah

Rappahannock




Click each of the numbered circles to learn about each of the river systems in Virginia and discover the watershed to which each belongs.


York



The York River flows into the Chesapeake Bay. The York River primarily drains water from the Coastal Plain.




Atlantic Ocean



Waterways on the Eastern Shore of Virginia drain directly into the Atlantic Ocean.




Chowan



The Chowan River runs through Virginia and North Carolina. The Chowan empties into the Albemarle Sound of North Carolina.




Chesapeake Bay, Coastal
