

Restatement



Definition


Restatement is stating the same point repeatedly, but with different wording.

Example

He felt that the government did not have the authority to levy a tax on his house. He was sure that property taxes were unconstitutional.



Repetition



Definition


Repetition is stating the same thing, usually a memorable phrase, repeatedly.

Example

Today we can make yesterday's failures just a memory. Today we can choose a new path to travel. Today we can begin tomorrow.



Parallelism



Definition


Parallelism is listing or explaining points in the same format.

Example

He was accused by those who were to blame, convicted by those who were guilty, and executed by those who were corrupt.



Rhetorical Questioning



Definition


Rhetorical questioning is asking a question for which the speaker does not actually want an answer but rather wants to provoke thought.

Example

Should we allow others to dictate our future? Should we blindly go where we are told?

Definition


An example gives a representation or a sample of an object, idea, or scenario.

Example

We must be willing to sacrifice comfort to make a difference. An example is Dr. Rachel Martin who left her warm home to live in shelters and provide care for the sick during the recent epidemic. Hundreds survived as a result of her sacrifice

Definition


Definition explains the meaning or terms of something.

Example

Heroic acts are ones where individuals ignore personal risk to help others in need.



Comparison and Contrast



Definition


Comparison and contrast explains the similarities and differences between at least two items.

Example

While lemons and oranges are both citrus fruits, oranges have a sweeter taste than lemons.



Sequence of Events



Definition


A sequence of events describes occurrences in chronological order.

Example

It began to rain. The road surface became wet. As the temperature dropped, the water on the road froze and became a thin sheet of ice. Cars began to slide on the icy coating.



Cause and Effect



Definition


Cause and effect illustrates what happens (effect) as a result of an action (cause).

Example

Recent hurricanes have caused insurance companies to pay millions of dollars in damage claims. The effect of these costly claims has been insurance policy changes that decrease coverage and raise the homeowner's deductible.



Description



Definition


Descriptions portray the characteristics of something.

Example

Quinoa is a grain grown in Andean regions of South America. It is high in protein and fiber and has a sweet, nutty flavor.



Narration




Definition

Narration tells a story.

Example

While driving past a drainage pond, David Tyree noticed a boy struggling to keep his head above water. David stopped the car and ran to the pond as the boy splashed frantically. David swam out and pulled the boy to the shore.
