Revising for a Specific Audience

Typical Questions for Revising and Editing

- Introduction
- Revising for a Specific Audience
 - Have enough details been presented for the audience to understand the paper's topic, position, and evidence?
 - Are ideas presented in a logical order that will keep the reader engaged?
 - Are clear transitions used to help the reader follow a clear train of thought?
 - Are sentences clear and specific?
 - Do the sentences say what I mean for them to say?
 - Is the tone and style appropriate for the audience?

- Is the purpose clearly stated for the reader?
- Is this purpose maintained throughout the paper?
- Does the supporting information clearly relate to my purpose?
- Does the organization best fulfill the purpose?

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Editing for Form

Typical Questions for Revising and Editing

- Introduction

 - Does my paper follow the correct format as given in the assignment instructions?
 - Are distinct ideas explained in separate paragraphs with clear topic sentences?
 - Is there balance among my points? Have I developed each to the same extent?
 - Does the paper rely mostly on my ideas rather than ideas or facts cited by other sources?

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
