
Introduction



Throughout human history, innumerable stories have been told and retold so often that certain story elements show a pattern of repetition, even across different cultures and time periods. These repeated patterns are called archetypes, and they can take such forms as settings, plots, imagery, themes, and other story elements. Click each of the tabs to examine several character archetypes.



Caretaker



The caretaker archetype takes care of or is responsible for someone who cannot take care of himself or herself. This character offers constant support.



Earth Mother



The Earth mother archetype nurtures, guides, teaches, and explains. She represents the home and fertility. In addition to protecting the hero, she offers unconditional love.



Faithful Companion



The faithful companion archetype offers loyalty, support, and constant friendship. This character is usually a secondary character and supports the hero or heroine.



Hero/Heroine



The hero or heroine archetype is usually the protagonist of the story. This character battles against the villain, or opposing force, and represents goodness. Heroes and heroines often possess powers that surpass ordinary human abilities to perform extraordinary deeds.



Innocent



The innocent archetype is childlike and naive, one who lacks sophistication as well as experience.



Misfit



The misfit archetype does not fit in well with any group because the character is poorly adapted or because the character does not feel or have any connection to a group.



Mother/Father Figure



The mother or father figure archetype protects, disciplines, and gives unconditional love.




Outsider/Outcast



The outsider or outcast archetype is alienated or ostracized by society. This character is either cast away from society or voluntarily abandons it.



Rebel



The rebel archetype opposes authority. This character rejects the values of his or her society.



Rugged Individualist



The rugged individualist archetype believes in self-reliance. This character is an independent thinker and relies on his or her personal strengths.



Shrew



The shrew archetype is a female character who does not conform to society's rules and expectations. She is sometimes characterized as having a violent temper or being an unpleasant nag.



Trickster



The trickster archetype deceives, swindles, and tricks others. This character is known to enjoy being mischievous and is generally untrustworthy.



Villain



The villain archetype opposes the hero or heroine. This character often has an evil nature and is known to cause chaos or mayhem.
