

Introduction


King Arthur



King Arthur was rumored to have united the Britons against the invading Vikings during the 5^{th} and 6^{th} centuries. According to legend, he proved his right to rule by pulling a sword from a stone in Westminster, which is located in central London. It was a magic sword, and only the person who was fit to rule the Britons could remove it from the stone. Throughout literature, Arthur has been characterized as a wise, patient ruler, as well as a fierce warrior.



Camelot



Camelot was King Arthur's kingdom, and it had a reputation for being an ideal kingdom. In Camelot, Arthur had a round table at which he and all of his knights sat to discuss matters of the kingdom and to make laws. The table was round to give the knights the impression that no one person, including Arthur, was more important than another. In modern times, a location may be referred to as a "Camelot" to suggest that it is perfect or ideal.




Merlin



Merlin was a wizard who helped raise and educate King Arthur. He encouraged Arthur to attempt to remove the sword from the stone. When Arthur ruled from Camelot, Merlin was his advisor and helped protect his interests.




Guinevere



King Arthur married Lady Guinevere. Legend describes her as being significantly younger than King Arthur, and later in their marriage, she fell in love with one of the Knights of the Round Table, Lancelot.




Lancelot



Lancelot was a knight who became King Arthur's best friend and most loyal advisor. Following the code of chivalry, Lancelot asked to become the Queen's champion to defend her honor. Lancelot's relationship with King Arthur was destroyed when he and Guinevere fell in love.



Excalibur



Excalibur was the name of King Arthur's sword, which was given to him by a magical woman named the Lady of the Lake. The steel was extremely sturdy, and according to legend, whoever held the sword would not die of battle wounds.
