

Introduction


Highlighting Text



One of the best ways to point out a passage in a paper is to use the Highlight tool found in many word processing programs. Often as simple as selecting text and choosing a color, highlighting is an ideal way to emphasize text because the bright colors grab the reader's attention, even for small selections such as a single comma.



Changing Text Color



Many word processing programs allow you to change the color of text. For example, if you want to identify all the passages that are ambiguous, you may opt to select the text and apply a new text color that will grab the reader's attention.




Inserting Comments



When reviewing a written work, there may be times when you want to comment on a specific passage without making any modifications. For example, you may want to ask a question to clarify something, or perhaps you want to offer praise where an argument was well executed. Most word processing software offers a feature that allows you to insert comments throughout a document.



Tracking Changes



The ability to keep track of changes made by a reviewer is among the most useful tools for revising and collaborating on a document. If your word processing software offers the ability to record changes, you can use this feature to make revisions directly to the document you are reviewing. When receiving feedback from a peer reviewer or instructor who has utilized a tool for tracking changes, the same feature allows you to easily accept suggested changes, which will then be automatically incorporated into the document, or to reject suggestions, which will maintain your original text.
