

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Morals




A moral is a lesson that the author wants to teach about life. It is usually a lesson about how people should be or act. These are often told through short tales of morality or animal tales that teach a lesson. Most commonly, you may have seen morals stated or strongly implied at the end of a work.



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Universal Truths



A universal truth is not always pleasant. These are truths about life or human nature that are true around the globe. They might point out unpleasant human behaviors. Universal truths are messages that are considered true universally like "love can lead to exploration of one's soul" or "friendship is important to adolescent survival."
