

Introduction



There are numerous prewriting strategies that can help you narrow down your topic and focus your research. Different strategies may work better for you depending on your personality or even the assignment at hand, so try several of them to see which are the most comfortable and effective for you. Freewriting




Freewriting involves setting a timer and writing nonstop for ten or fifteen minutes. You can write about anything that comes to mind or about anything that is already on your mind. The important part of this exercise is to keep writing. Even if you get stuck or are not sure what to write, keep your pen moving or your fingers typing anyway. 

Clustering




Clustering, also called mind mapping or webbing, allows you to view relationships between related ideas in a visual manner. Start by writing a general topic in the center of your paper and circle it. Then, write down other related ideas around the circle. As you write these ideas, circle them and draw lines connecting each item to related ideas. Listing



Listing is a technique in which you create a list by freely jotting down ideas as they come to mind. Start with a keyword or idea related to your writing assignment, and then start listing words or phrases. Click the image below to view an example of listing.
