

Introduction



Prior to conducting research, it is very important that you take time to develop research questions. These questions will help you focus on the parts of your topic that you need to learn more about before you can draft a research paper. To help you determine what you want or need to know regarding your selected topic, try out one or more of the prewriting strategies in this interactivity. Click each of the tabs to explore strategies for focusing your research.



5W/H



Identify basic information about your subject by answering the 5W/H questions (*who*, *what*, *where*, *when*, *why*, and *how*). Any questions that you cannot answer would be good places to begin your research.

He was an African-American minister who fought for equal rights for all races during the 1950s and 60s.

What did he do for civil rights?

He made famous speeches and led nonviolent protests against discrimination. Did he also win the Nobel Peace Prize?

Where did he protest? research this!


Why is he remembered today?

He rallied people to support equal rights for all without resorting to violence.

KWL Chart


