

#### Introduction


#### **Comedies**


#### **Tragedies**



Tragedies are plays that deal with death, morality, and destruction. The main characters are nobles, and the primary character dies as a result of his or her one character flaw.



#### **Histories**



Histories are plays that teach moral lessons through the crimes and negative actions of real leaders and kings.
