

Introduction



As you were reading the first act of *Romeo and Juliet*, you probably noticed how stage directions helped you to understand how the action of the play would unfold on the stage. Stage directions are written instructions in a script, often appearing in italics or brackets. They can indicate stage actions, delivery of lines by performers, and production requirements such as costumes, lighting, or props. Of course, stage directions are not read aloud by the actors. In this interactivity, click the three ways that stage directions are used in *Romeo and Juliet* to view examples from the first act.

Indicating Stage Entrances and Exits



Part, fools!


Put up your swords; you know not what you do.

Indicating Asides



Stage directions are used to indicate asides, or spoken lines that are not heard by other characters on the stage. Read the excerpt below from Act I and click the line that indicates a stage direction. The stage direction will become highlighted once you have correctly selected it.

SAMPSON

[Aside to GREGORY.] Is the law of our side, if I say ay?

GREGORY

No.
