

Coordinating conjunctions link equal grammatical elements of a sentence. For example, they can link two or more nouns, adjectives, phrases, or even clauses. There are seven of these coordinating conjunctions. An easy way to remember them is to use the mnemonic device FANBOYS: *for*, *and*, *nor*, *but*, *or*, *yet*, and *so*. # **Linking Words**

For each of the three examples below, hover your mouse over the coordinating conjunction to view the words that are linked.


Today I'm going to eat pizza, soup, or salad for lunch.

For each of the three examples below, hover your mouse over the coordinating conjunction to view the phrases that are linked.


Candidates who held public polls or attended debates received more votes.

## Linking Dependent Clauses



Coordinating conjunctions link two or more dependent clauses. Recall that a dependent clause has a subject and a verb but is not a complete sentence.
