

Introduction




Some of the most highly praised novels in American literature have been referred to as the Great American Novel. What is a Great American Novel? It is a fiction novel that vividly captures American life and culture in a specific time and place. However, there is no single Great American Novel. Rather, it is more of an honorific title informally bestowed upon some of America's most cherished works of literature that provide a rich portrayal of a part of American society. People may disagree on which novels make the list, but very few deny the literary skill with which the most celebrated American authors have crafted their stories. 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James Fenimore Cooper



James Fenimore Cooper was born in New Jersey in 1789. His novel *The Last of the Mohicans* (1826) features life in colonial America during the French and Indian War when colonists and Native Americans regularly clashed in armed conflict.




Herman Melville



Herman Melville was born in New York City in 1819. His novel *Moby-Dick* (1851) takes readers sailing around the world aboard a whaling ship in the early 1800s. However, the ship's captain is actually on a quest to seek revenge on a dangerous white whale.



Mark Twain



Mark Twain was born in Missouri in 1835. His most famous novel, *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* (1884), is set in the antebellum South. Its protagonist is a young boy who befriends a slave named Jim and helps him escape to freedom.




Jack London



Jack London was born in San Francisco in 1876. His novel *The Call of the Wild* (1903) was inspired by his experiences prospecting during the Klondike Gold Rush of the 1890s. It features a sled dog who embraces his wild instinct in order to survive.




F. Scott Fitzgerald



F. Scott Fitzgerald was born in Minnesota in 1896. He is best known for his novel *The Great Gatsby* (1925), a tragedy set during the Roaring Twenties. Its characters indulge in decadence and glamour yet become disillusioned with the American Dream.



John Steinbeck



John Steinbeck was born in California in 1902. His novel *The Grapes of Wrath* (1939) follows a poor family of Oklahoma farmers who migrate west during the Great Depression in hopes of escaping poverty and rebuilding their lives.



Richard Wright



Richard Wright was born in Mississippi in 1908. His novel *Native Son* (1940) features a man living in Chicago who inadvertently becomes entangled in crime and struggles to rise above a society bent against him.



Harper Lee



Harper Lee was born in Alabama in 1926. Her novel *To Kill a Mockingbird* (1960) is about racial tension in 1930s Alabama when an innocent man is accused of a crime. The story is told through the eyes of his lawyer's young daughter, Scout.
