




Compare and Contrast




A compare-and-contrast expository text aims to examine the similarities and differences between two or more things. Click the images below to view two possible options for organizing a compare and contrast.







Problem-Solution




A problem-solution expository text aims to examine a problem and propose one or more solutions. Click the images below to view two possible options for organizing a problem-solution.









Cause and Effect




A cause-and-effect expository text aims to explain how or why something happened or the resulting effects of something. Click the images below to view two possible options for organizing a cause and effect.









Analysis




An analysis expository text aims to analyze how something works, how it is defined, or what its parts or defining characteristics are. Click the images below to view two possible options for organizing an analysis.
