

Introduction - Mr. Baker


Marcos



"Donnie! I've been waiting for you forever. Let's go!"




Donnie



"Hang on a second. Mr. Baker looks like he might be finishing up his conversation with Cindy."




Marcos



"Oh man! You're too slow! Cindy is done talking, but now Janelle has cut you off and is speaking with Mr. B. This is ridiculous. I'm starving!"




Donnie


Janelle




Janelle
