


## Tips for Viewing and Navigating Review Interactivities Virginia and United States Government

Throughout the course, you will find interactivities used to review content. Most review interactivities follow a similar layout. In most instances, audio will not be included in the interactivity. This document provides tips for viewing and navigating review interactivities.

### Instructions

All review interactivities include **instructions** on how to answer the review questions that are in the interactivity. After reading the instructions, click the **Click Here to Get Started** button to start the review.



### Submitting a Question

A variety of question types are used in review interactivities. Once you have answered a question, click the **Submit** button to check your answer. The example below shows a **multiple-choice** question.



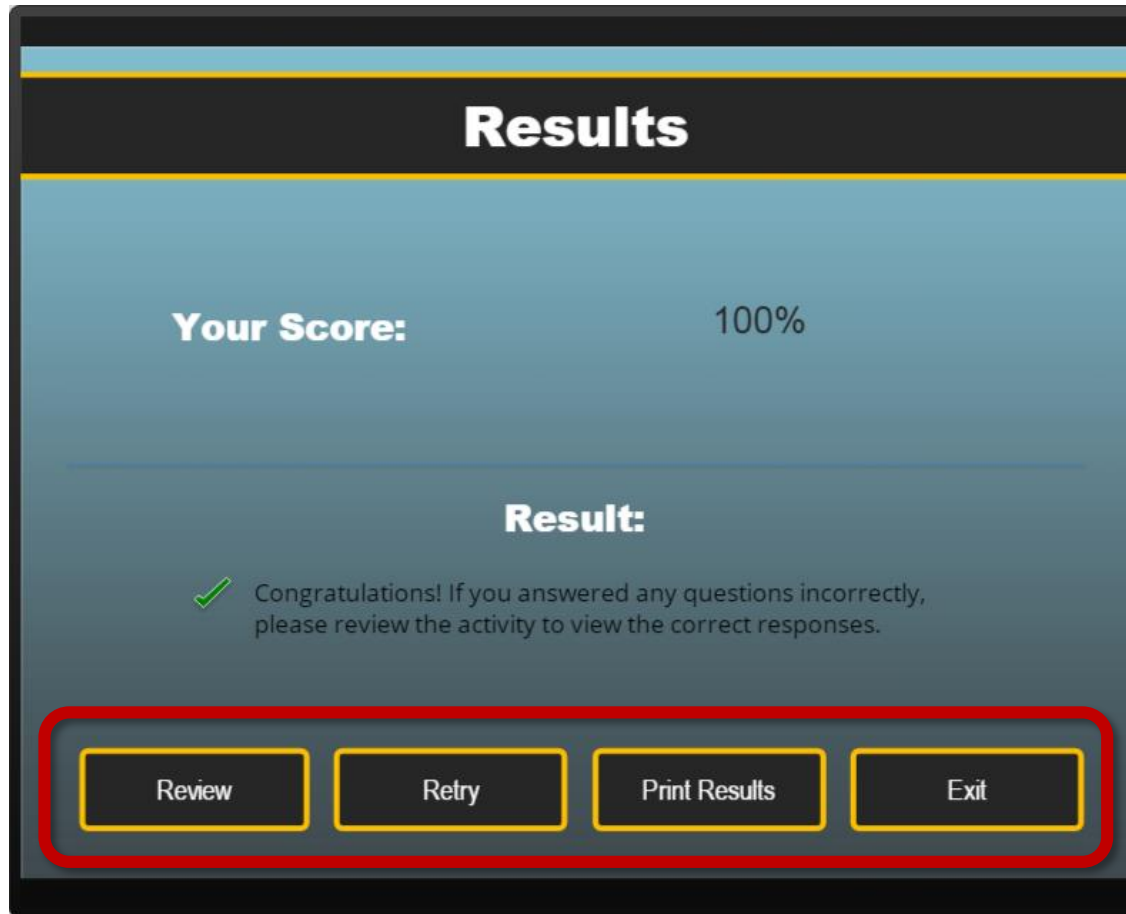

### The Results Slide

All review interactivities include a **results slide**, which appears when all of the questions have been answered. The results slide contains your score and options to review the quiz, retry the quiz, print the results, or exit the quiz. The example below shows a **results slide**.




**Player Buttons:**

### How to View and Print the Review Interactivity Results

Upon clicking the **Print Results** button, you will be prompted to enter your name in the blank field. Click the **OK** button to view the results page.

1. Print the results page to submit it in-person or scan the printed page to create a digital copy.
2. Print or save the results page as an **Adobe® PDF** file.
3. Take a screen shot of the results page to save it as an image file.

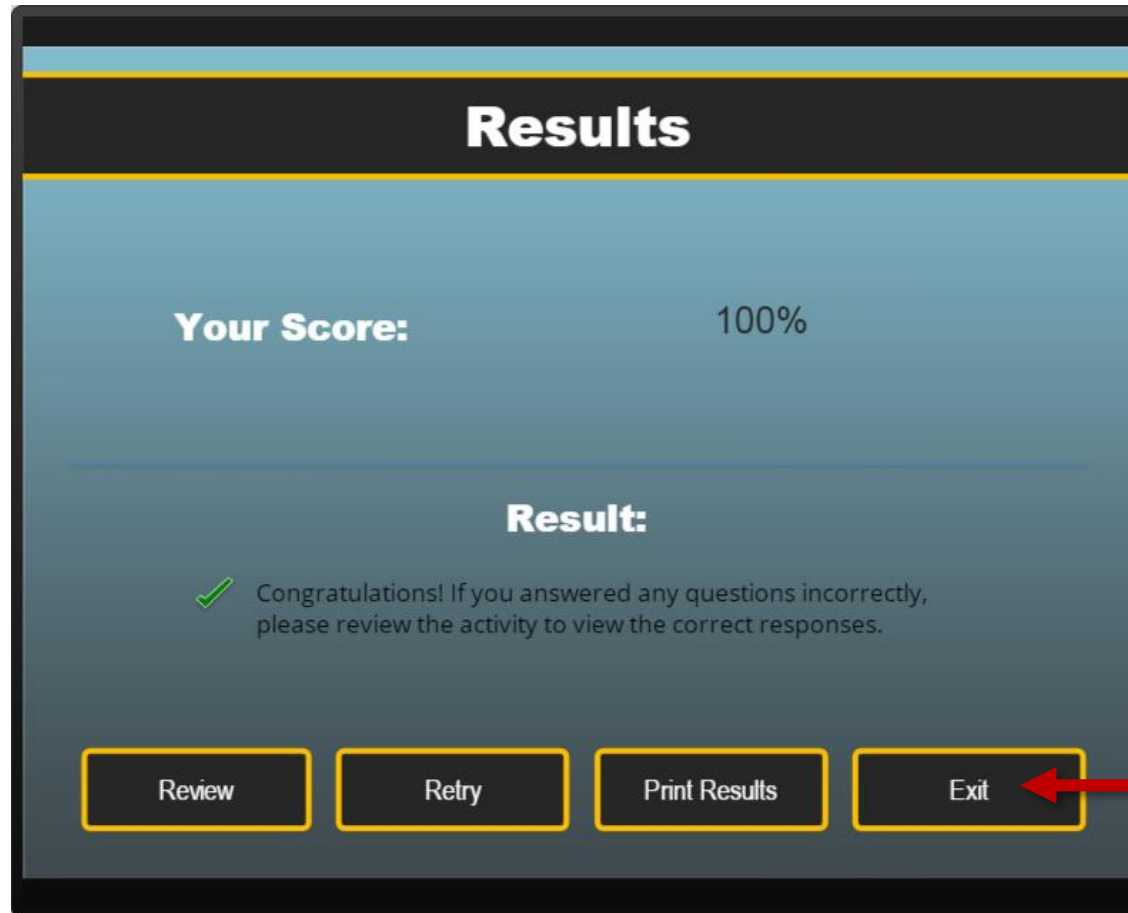

### How to Exit a Review Interactivity

Most interactivities have an **Exit** button that can be used to exit the review interactivity.




**Exit Button:**

### How to Exit a Review Interactivity (continued)

All review interactivities are set to open in a new browser tab. To exit a review interactivity, simply close the browser tab by click the “x” located in the corresponding tab.
