
Global Guide Introduction


Forms of Government



Emily Airheart: There are many different types of governments around the world. Here are some of the governments that I have encountered during my travels.





Autocracy



Emily Airheart: In an autocracy, one person, known as the autocrat, holds all power. The autocrat does not have to consult with anyone regarding government decisions. His or her decisions are not required to follow any rule or law. The autocrat has unlimited power.

When an autocrat attains power by force, the autocracy is known specifically as a totalitarian dictatorship.



Oligarchy




Emily Airheart: In an oligarchy, power is held by a small group of individuals.

If the group of individuals has come into power based on wealth or position of privilege, the oligarchy is known as an aristocracy.

If the group has come into power by force, the oligarchy is known as a dictatorship.




Democracy



Emily Airheart: In a democracy, the greatest power rests with the people. The core of a democracy is the social contract, or constitution, that exists between citizens and leaders. The constitution details the rights entitled to citizens, as well as the rights that citizens agree to relinquish, in exchange for certain protection and guarantees from the government.



Monarchy



Emily Airheart: In a monarchy, power resides with a monarch, usually a king or queen. Power is inherited, or passed down, through a royal family.

In an absolute monarchy, the monarch has unlimited control of the government. The monarch holds all power and authority regarding government decisions.

In a constitutional monarchy, a social contract, or constitution, exists between the monarch and the people. The constitution defines the limits of the monarch and the role of the government.

It is important to note that many constitutional monarchies are actually a combination of a constitutional monarchy and a representative democracy.



Theocracy



Emily Airheart: In a theocracy, a religious leader holds power by divine right from a deity. The laws in this type of government have their roots in a religion or a religious doctrine.

A theocratic government can exist in conjunction with other forms of government, such as monarchies, dictatorships, oligarchies, or democracies.
