
Presidential Presence



Preston Dent: Welcome back to *Presidential Presence*. There are different ways to break down the responsibilities of the President. There may be more or fewer roles depending on how you categorize them. In this segment, we will be discussing eight roles of the President of the United States.



Chief of State



Preston Dent: Serving as the Chief of State means that the President is the ceremonial head of the United States government. Think of all the times that you have seen the President greet visiting foreign leaders, celebrate national holidays, make speeches to mark special occasions or events, and award medals and other honors. This is because the President is essentially the symbolic head of America. The President is the face of our nation while in office.



Chief Executive



Preston Dent: This role is clearly established in the U.S. Constitution. As the Chief Executive, the President is responsible for enforcing the laws of the land. The responsibilities of this role include deciding how the laws of the United States are going to be enforced; appointing Cabinet members, agency heads, and other government positions; issuing executive orders; and giving the State of the Union address.



Chief Administrator



Preston Dent: Imagine that all of the government employees in the executive branch are a corporation. The President would be considered the CEO of that corporation. Every single member of the executive branch of government serves the President of the United States. Just like a CEO, as the boss of the executive branch, the President must hold meetings to discuss current public policy, read reports from various government agencies; and direct the organization as a whole.




Chief Diplomat



Preston Dent: As the symbolic head of the American government, the President also serves as the nation's main spokesperson to the world. Although assisted by appointed advisors, diplomats, and Secretary of State, the President is the architect of the nation's current foreign policy. This means the President is responsible for representing America during meetings and correspondence with world leaders. The Constitution also clearly states that the President has the power to make treaties with other nations, pending Congressional approval.




Commander-in-Chief



Preston Dent: The President has the responsibility to ensure the safety and security of the nation. Congress has the power to declare war, but it is the President who coordinates the military campaigns. The President serves as the head of the United States military. This includes the Army, Navy, Air Force, and the Marines. The President has the final call in all military matters, meaning that Generals and Admirals take their orders from the President. The Commander-in-Chief is also the only person with the ability to authorize the use of nuclear weapons.



Chief Legislator



Preston Dent: The legislative branch makes the laws; however, the Constitution allows the President to influence Congress while it creates public policy. The President may urge Congress to pass a bill or defeat a piece of legislation. The President may do this indirectly, through speeches to the American citizens, or directly, through the State of the Union address and the federal budget proposal. Additionally, when new legislation is passed, the President decides whether to sign the bill into law or veto it.



Chief of Party



Preston Dent: The President is viewed as the highest ranking member of whichever political party he or she belongs to. While in office, the President serves as the head of the party, and is responsible for nominating party members to different positions and campaigning for politicians who support the party's policies.



Chief Citizen



Preston Dent: The President acts as the representative of all citizens of the United States. As an elected representative in a representative democracy, the President is supposed to work for the benefit of the people. The President's interests should come after the interests of the nation as a whole.
