
Introduction


Farming



Because of the good climate and fertile soil, small-scale farming became widespread in the Middle colonies. Wheat and corn were crops commonly grown in this region and were exported world-wide. Farmers also traded and sold their goods to other colonists.




Shipbuilding



The use of ships for traveling, fishing, and trading remained constant throughout the colonial period. This demand for ships created a boom in the shipbuilding industry. Shipbuilding was very profitable in the Middle colonies because of the abundant forests and access to water in this region. The weather was less harsh than in the New England colonies, attracting European craftsmen who wanted to settle in the New World.




Middle Class



The diverse economic activity in the Middle colonies led to the development of a middle class, which consisted of small farmers, skilled artisans, and business owners. Skilled artisans in this region included shipbuilders, blacksmiths, bricklayers, glass blowers, and tailors.



Trade




As settlers in the Middle colonies prospered through their hard work, as had the Puritans in the New England colonies, strong beliefs in private ownership of property and free enterprise flourished. Trade was strongly encouraged, causing port cities like Philadelphia and New York to grow rapidly and become two of the largest cities in North America during the colonial period. Port cities in both the New England and Southern colonies also experienced growth.



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Slavery



Slavery existed in the Middle colonies, but on a smaller scale than in the Southern colonies. The Dutch used slave labor in New Netherland to expand the colony. Slave labor was also used by farmers and artisans in the Middle colonies; however, there was not as strong an economic need for slaves in this region compared to the Southern colonies.
