



Image: American citizens protesting the War in Arlington, Virginia




Money

Psychological Effects



Television




American citizens had never before been able to witness the horrors of war. Television coverage brought the Vietnam War into the living rooms of people all across America.

Treatment of Veterans




When war veterans finally returned home, they often were faced with hostility from people who thought they lost the war, or anger from others who believed they killed innocent people. This was different from the homecoming of veterans from World War II, who were honored as heroes. It took many years before Vietnam veterans received recognition for their service.

Memorial



Finally, in 1982, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial was unveiled in Washington D.C., to honor those who served during the war. Visitors can read the names of the 58,200 American service men and women who were killed or went missing during the war.
