
International Political Divisions




African Union (AU)



The African Union, or AU, is a political and economic alliance of fifty-five African nations. The AU was formed to encourage international cooperation, increase economic development, and promote peace and security on the African continent.



Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN)



ASEAN, which stands for the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, is an economic and political alliance of ten countries in Southeast Asia. The purpose of ASEAN is to promote cooperation and economic development among its member nations.



European Union (EU)



The European Union, or EU, is a political and economic alliance created to encourage stability and free trade among European nations. As of 2018, there are twenty-eight member nations; however, the UK is currently scheduled to withdraw from the EU by 2020.




League of Arab States



The League of Arab States, also called the Arab League, is an example of a cultural alliance that has developed into a political alliance. Its member nations are from the Arab world, which is a cultural region composed of Arabic-speaking countries. The alliance was formed to unify and protect the region. It has twenty-two members as of 2018.



North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA)





North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)


Defense alliance formed during the Cold War



NATO stands for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. NATO is a defense alliance that was formed during the Cold War. Although the political alliance began with only twelve members in 1949, it has continued to grow to twenty-nine members as of 2018.



Organization of American States (OAS)



The Organization of American States, or OAS, was created to promote cooperation and help resolve disputes among member nations. As of 2018, all thirty-five independent countries of the Americas are members.

Drganization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (DPEC) Economic alliance to stabilize the oil industry and ensure steady profit for members



The United Nations, commonly called the UN, is an international organization that was created to help maintain international stability and order. Since its creation at the end of World War II, the UN has played an important role in encouraging peaceful resolutions. As of 2018, out of 195 countries, 193 are members of the organization. The other two, the Vatican and Palestine, are non-member observer states.
