



#### **Indian Ocean**




The Indian Ocean surrounds the subcontinent of India. It made access to the southern half of the continent difficult.

#### Himalayas



#### Hindu Kush




The Hindu Kush is a smaller mountain range than the Himalayas. It is located in India's northwest.

## **Khyber Pass**



#### **Indus River**


