

Constantinople was on a peninsula that was located on the shores of the Bosporus, a strait that linked the Mediterranean and Black Seas. The city's natural harbors, and its being bordered on three sides by water, made Constantinople easy to defend, and an important center of trade.


Advantages of Being Far from Invaders



Constantinople was situated far from the Germanic invasions that threatened the survival of the western half of the Roman Empire at the time.

Constantinople was located at a crossroads of trade that linked the Asian and European markets. The city's favorable location made it one of Europe's busiest marketplaces. Europeans sought silk, spices, jewelry, and ivory from the East, and industries in Constantinople turned many of these raw goods into finished products for other parts of the world. In addition, taxes from trade and industry were collected to support the activities of the imperial government.
